## Rev'd Tracey writes ...

I hope your Lenten challenges of giving up something, taking up something, or doing something different are going well, for we still have a while to go. March, for the large part, sees Lent continue, so we might need a little encouragement along the way. The phrase, 'Just keep on, keeping on' rose to popularity when Martin Luther King cited it in a speech in 1964. I offer it to you as encouragement and hope, as we continue our journey towards Easter.

Hope is one of my favourite words, and Easter is the greatest ever story of hope! Jesus's story is one where his resurrection destroys the despair of death. It's a story of life overcoming death, and goodness triumphing over evil.

For the disciples, the crucifixion of Jesus, I imagine took them into a very dark place. On Holy Saturday it probably felt like there was hope for them at all. Dreams were destroyed; their direction and purpose in life had been taken from them. Everything would have felt meaningless. Perhaps this story offers us a chance to bring hope into the lives of others, for we know the end of the story, we are resurrection people.

We know the story of Jesus overcoming death itself, we know the stories of how he came alongside those who were walking away, or were frightened and scared. We know that the Easter story is of one where God is outworking his purpose in the world and that by the gift of the Holy Spirit in us, we are participants in Jesus' mission, today and tomorrow and until he comes in glory.

St Paul's have stories of hope because Jesus is in the church. Where Jesus is present, we can expect to see the transformation and signs of resurrection. Stories of hope are present in our community; stories of kindness; stories of activity and activism and stories of conversion.

All this is bound up in the story of the one who was crucified for us; who rose on Easter Sunday and who then equipped his disciples to take on his mantle in the world.

Today, we are mandated to serve in his name, so that everyone know the love and life-giving-ness of the Resurrection, and with Jesus' love blended with ours, to show that love in the world.

This Easter, I pray you may know the hope of Christ in new ways so that your heart is set on fire with love for Him, and that you share this same hope in the community you love and among the people you serve. In joyous anticipation I say

'Christ is Risen – He is Risen indeed Alleluia!' Rev'd Tracey Voysey

## **Curry Night**

Finally, February brought us the second fabulous appearance of the Curry Guys, dreamt up by Allison last year, to make a change from our annual Soup 'n Puds lunch, and a roaring success from the outset.

This year we filled the bookings a week ahead of the event and once again the village hall was transformed by lights and music into something closer to Mumbai or Delhi; the eponymous curry guys created a blur of activity in the kitchen and around the tables, and we all revelled in this further evidence of the energy and versatility of our Awliscombe community. ## **The Coventry Passion Cross**

For many years now, I have had a simple cross on my prayer desk, that I often finds help me to focus my prayers. It is made of three plain black wrought iron nails, and measures about 4 x 3 inches. I've never visited Coventry Cathedral—maybe one day! I was really interested to discover the following though, about the Coventry Cathedral Passion Cross—the cathedral's emblem. It is made up of three nails together forming the Cross of Christ. What might those nails (and those in my little cross) be?

The first nail is the carpenter's nail and focuses us on the purpose of the nail. We are reminded that Jesus worked as a carpenter before entering His ministry. As He sat there in His carpenter's workshop, smoothing and working the wood with love, did He contemplate the rugged cross on which He would one day be crucified? As He hammered nails into wood, did He ever accidentally hammer one into His finger, and as He felt that pain, did

He foresee the nails of His crucifixion? As He carried large logs to His workshop to make tables, chairs, and doors, did He contemplate the cross he would one day carry to Calvary?

The second nail is the nail of *Passion*, it represents the nails in Jesus' hands and feet that He accepted because of His passionate love for us.

The third nail is the nail of Promise, like the promise He made to the dying thief on the cross. It was that if we believe in Him, then we will reign with Him in paradise. This is the nail that Christ offers to you and to me. Will you accept this nail as a sign of His passionate love, His forgiveness of your sin and promise of eternal life for all who will come to Him? If so, why not pray the following prayer this Holy Week & Easter? <u>Prayer</u>

Dear Lord Jesus, thank You that You have a plan and a purpose for my life, thank You for Your passionate love for me, thank You that Your blood was shed for my sins, thank You for Your promise of eternal life. As I think about that nail of promise, I receive Your passion, Your grace and Your forgiveness, may I fulfil Your plan and purpose for my life, In Jesus name, Amen.


## **Christian Aid and doing things together**

It has come as a great relief to us on the Committee that, thanks to Deborah our newest member, we have now found our next Treasurer, with plenty of time for her to learn the 'ins and outs' of the role, well ahead of Christian Aid Week in May. Some of those 'ins and outs' will involve using the chequebook for the Committee's bank account, even though many of us now hardly use such a thing domestically, in this 21<sup>st</sup> century of cards and smartphones. This is because, for charities as much as businesses, it is good practice to share the responsibility for signing cheques, rather than leave it to a Treasurer alone. Then local people like you, who give generously to Christian Aid, can trust that your donations are being handled carefully and responsibly, respecting our Committee's decisions about payments to Christian Aid nationally. Our local rule, agreed with the bank, is that any cheque of ours must be signed by any two people already on our list of approved signatories. There are three or four of us on this list at any one time, with specimens of our signatures on record at the bank; so there's some flexibility in our arrangements (Our Treasurer is allowed to go on holiday!), at the same time as we're running a tight ship when it comes to moving the actual treasure.

Many years ago, I learned that there is a technical term to describe the relationship between co-signatories to cheques: "in solidum". Yes, it's Latin, but mercifully we can all work it out. Believe it or not, I learned this, not from my father whose whole working life was with Barclays, but from a lecture in Year 2 of the Theology course at Exeter... a Doctrine lecture! Theologians of the early Church borrowed the term 'in solidum' from the world of banking (hopefully without interest payments!), and applied it to the way the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit relate to one another and act together within the divine life of God. Three co-signatories in a committee of three, with all three members deciding and acting together in anything to be done by the God of Love. Creation?...Salvation?...Sanctification? Sometimes in the liturgies of the Church it may be convenient to push one of these activities towards one particular member of the Trinity more than the other two; but the deeper truth is that Father, Son and Holy Spirit are always equally "all signed up" to all the divine decisions, commitments, and activities, that we Christians can trace in the life of God, touching our world and our humanity. Not so much a traffic light with three colours to do different things, as three whole sets of traffic lights, always agreeing in love when to show\_red together, or amber, or green. We can trust that we are infinitely safer, more loved, in the cosigning hands of the solid Holy Trinity, than we could possibly be in the slippery hands of other gods, each with their own agenda.

As we come through Lent to the day-by-day intensity of Holy Week, of course the focus is strongly on Jesus of Nazareth going to his individual cross, where he will be recognized as Son of God (with Latin words included on the inscription), as if only Jesus saves. But maybe something as humble as a committee's chequebook (safer than the Judas way), or a gift to Christian Aid because "God so loved the world", or a three-cornered palm cross, can prompt us, even that week, to say "Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit." And then, of course, there'll be something inevitable, and more 'solid', about Easter. John Harrisson

## **God in Music**

'Glorious the song when God's the theme': Hildegard of Bingen

In this series we have looked at the psalms of the Old Testament and the songs of the New Testament, and now we enter the Middle Ages. But it is the Middle Ages through the eyes of a record producer in the last century.

In 1980 Ted Perry decided to found a new independent record company, Hyperion. If that was not financial risk enough, in the following year Hyperion issued a CD of a composer virtually unknown in the 1980s — Hildegard of Bingen. The risk paid off, and Gothic Voices' recording of the music of this remarkable medieval nun became a best seller. The CD sold in its thousands and received awards from the gramophone industry.

'A feather on the breath of God', the title of the CD, is how Hildegard

described herself. 'Listen, there was a king sitting on his throne. Around him stood great and wonderfully beautiful columns ornamented with ivory, bearing the banners of the king with great honour. Then it pleased the king to raise a small feather from the ground and he commanded it to fly. The feather flew, not because of anything in itself, but because the air bore it along. Thus am I a feather on the breath of God.' Hildegard was born in 1098, the tenth child of noble parents who lived in western Germany. Aged only eight, she was given into the care of Jutta, abbess of a monastery in the Rhineland, near Bingen. There she lived the life of an enclosed nun, her only contact with the world outside via a grille through which food was passed.

After 30 years, Hildegard left that cell and was assigned a scribe, who wrote down her visions and meditations in two volumes. She founded two monasteries, wrote books on medicine and natural healing and the first morality play, and composed a great range of songs. She corresponded with the great and the good, and as the 'Sybil of the Rhine,' her advice was sought by popes and emperors, by kings and bishops. A truly creative life of prayer and service until her death in 1179.

The starting point for her own compositions was the plainsong of that time. Modern techniques of singing and performing often make plainsong slow and heavy. The secret to bringing plainchant alive is to sing it with relaxed attention. In many ways that is the secret of the life of prayer: that paradox of resting in the Lord while being alert to the promptings of his spirit. Hildegard realised that secret as she brought to her music, as she did to everything, an intensity of emotion and faith, developing the medieval plainchant into melodies that flowed off the page and soared into the skies.

## **Ringing Matters**

The East Devon Branch of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers Annual General Meeting saw a few changes. Trevor (Combe Raleigh) relinquished the post of chairman, for health reasons, to be replaced by Ian Rees (Honiton). ## Support for Russian priest who prays for peace

Thousands of Russian Orthodox Christians have been urging Patriarch Kirill of Moscow to reinstate a very popular priest in the capital, the Revd Alexei Uminsky, who has refused to recite an official prayer for Russia's victory over Ukraine.

An open letter, which attracted more than 11,000 signatures, including the heads of local charities, says: "The decree banning this priest from serving will deprive thousands of people of spiritual support – a great tragedy for many believers, for children's hospice patients, for hundreds of prisoners and thousands of homeless people."

Uminsky had repeatedly warned that he could not endorse the invasion of Ukraine.

Now Russia's online news agency, Gazeta.ru, says that Fr Uminsky was banned from ministering under a decree issued by the Moscow Patriarchate, for suggesting in a YouTube interview that Christians should "pray for peace, rather than victory".

The Russian news agency went on to say that Uminsky has long been seen as "a thorn in the Kremlin's side" for his anti-militarism. He was branded a 'criminal in a cassock' by the Russian Orthodox Church's own TV channel Spas, after calling for mercy for the opposition leader Alexei Navalny, during his prison hunger strike. For the moment, Uminsky remains banned, and may face defrocking as a priest. More than 300 Russian Orthodox priests, who signed an appeal against the Ukraine invasion of 2022, have since been silenced, or forced to emigrate.

## Dramatic decline of religion on TV

There is less television being devoted to religion and ethics than there used to be. A lot less.

The latest statistics from Ofcom, the industry regulator reveal a dramatic reduction in television programmes about 'religion and ethics' broadcast by the public-service broadcasting networks (PSBs): BBC, ITV, Channel 4 and Channel 5.

Comparing 2022 with 2011, peak time hours of 'first-run' UK origination output fell by 85 per cent; while peak-time hours of 'all origin' output (that is, including bought-in material) fell by 76 per cent. Channel 4 dropped from being the most prolific network to providing no output at all; and the BBC output fell by 65 per cent. Roger Bolton, a former BBC and ITV executive and independent producer, wrote recently in the Church Times: "All this has happened without a peep from Ofcom or the boards of the PSBs, who are supposed to protect the public interest. There have been no peeps, either, from religious leaders. They seem to be asleep, or preoccupied with their own internal issues, unaware of this wanton destruction."

"In my opinion, television commissioners ... underestimate the power of religion and the continuing interest in it. They also seem to forget that people are moral creatures, often keen to do the right thing, but wishing to discuss and debate what that is."

## Worldwide persecution of Christians on the increase

More than 365 million Christians worldwide now face persecution and discrimination for their faith. Entire Christian communities face extinction in some parts of the world. Those in sub-Saharan Africa are especially at risk, because of increasingly authoritarian regimes and violence.

So warns the latest global study of persecution.

The World Watch List 2024 is compiled by the charity Open Doors. It rates the top 50 countries where it is most dangerous to be a Christian. This year, something new has emerged: the countries listed have not changed since 2023, and there are no new countries to the list, but the level of violence experienced by Christians globally has grown exponentially in just this past year.

Open Doors reports a *sevenfold* increase in reported attacks on churches, Christian schools, and Christian hospitals. In 2022 there were 2,110 such attacks. In 2023 it was 14,766.

Attacks on the homes of Christian have also soared – by 371 per cent.

A staggering *one in seven* Christians worldwide now faces a high level of persecution and discrimination. This is the 30<sup>th</sup> year that the World Watch List has been compiled and published. The countries are scored by various factors: pressure levels in private life, family life, community life, and national life, and on church communities, as well as violence levels. This year's list covers the period between 1<sup>st</sup> October 2022 to 30<sup>th</sup>September 2023.

The chief executive of Open Doors UK, Henrietta Blyth, says that Christian minorities in East and West Africa face an existential threat from jihadists and autocratic regimes. Jihadists are viciously attacking Christians across sub-Saharan Africa: Somalia, Nigeria, Burkina Faso and Mali, to name just some countries.

In Nigeria, things have got particularly bad, where Islamist extremism is threatening many Christian communities. In fact, the murder of Christians in Nigeria accounts for a staggering 82 per cent of ALL Christians killed for their faith worldwide. Last year 4118 such murders were recorded, though many more were never even reported.

Open Doors has praised UK government efforts to become a global leader in standing up for the freedom of religion and belief, but it urges that the position of the Prime Minister's special envoy, currently held by Fiona Bruce MP, should be turned into a permanent, statutory post.

## Were you baptised, but never got round to being confirmed? Did baptism somehow pass you by as a youngster? It is NOT too late - it's NEVER too late. What can you do about it?

As there is a confirmation service on 9 May this year at Kilmington, I thought it might be timely to include something in this month's magazine for anyone who might be wondering about being confirmed. It's so often associated with young teenagers—a 'stage on the way' that people go through. However, it is by no means limited to one age group—anybody, however old can be confirmed, and often there are as many, if not more adults than youngsters at a confirmation serviced these days.



Confirmation is a chance for anyone who has already been baptised (perhaps baptised as a child) to commit themselves to Jesus – to 'confirm'

the promises made at their baptism. These promises publicly recognise God's love for us, and acknowledge that we all need to turn away from selfishness and evil and to accept God's offer of a fresh start with him. In declaring this faith we become a members of the local and worldwide Christian family and the Church promises to support and pray for us on our journey of faith. Confirmation is also an opportunity for those who don't already receive communion to start taking communion with the rest of the church family. In the Bible, baptism with water and praying for the gift of the Holy Spirit by laying on of hands were originally both used to welcome new Christians into faith in Jesus. Over the centuries they are now often done separately, with many people being baptised in water as children and then confirming their faith later when they are old enough to answer for themselves.

Confirmation services are led by the bishop. Those being confirmed declare that they have decided to turn away from everything which is evil or sinful and instead to turn towards Christ - the same promises used at baptism. If you were baptised as a young child your godparents will have made these promises on your behalf and you will renew these decisions and promises at Confirmation. You will declare your faith in front of your friends, sponsors and the wider congregation, who will all promise to support you and pray for you. You may have a sponsor, as you would at a baptism, to stand with you to support you in your journey of faith. The bishop will make the sign of the cross on your forehead with oil. The cross as a sign of belonging to Christ, and the oil as a sign of the Holy Spirit. The bishop will speak to each candidate by name saying: (name), God has called you by name and made you his own. He then lays his hand of the head of each as he prays: Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit.

Anyone may be confirmed who has been baptised, and as a general rule the Church of England suggests that anyone who is over 10 years old and can answer for themselves could be ready for confirmation.

- Maybe you've been baptised as a child but would like to make the promises for yourself now you're older.
- Maybe you've been baptised and following Jesus for a while but would like to make a fresh commitment to be a disciple of Jesus now.
- Maybe you've been baptised in another church and would like to formally become a member of the Anglican Communion, a worldwide body of which the Church of England is just one member.
- Maybe you're interested in making this commitment to Jesus but haven't been baptised.
   If you have never been baptised, then once again, it's never too late! As a general rule, adults are baptised and confirmed within the same service.




